

Workplace Safety Compliance Overview

Introduction

Employer Responsibilities

Failure to meet these responsibilities may expose organisations to legal and operational risks.

Hazard Identification

- **Environmental hazards**
- **Workplace ergonomics**

Identified hazards should be addressed through appropriate control measures.

Employee Training

Employees should receive appropriate safety training to ensure they understand workplace risks and safety procedures.

Training may include:

- **Equipment operation**
- **Emergency procedures**
- **Fire safety**
- **Hazard reporting**
- **Use of protective equipment**

Well-trained employees are better equipped to maintain safe working environments.

Incident Reporting

Organisations should establish procedures for reporting incidents, near misses, and safety concerns.

Incident reporting helps organisations:

- **Identify recurring safety issues**
- **Improve risk management procedures**
- **Prevent future incidents**

Reports should be documented and reviewed to support continuous improvement.
